The History And A Progress Report On The Extension



Work on the Shed extension has started moving again but it seems the gods are still conspiring against us. Now it is Huey the rain god.

Serious conceptual plans to extend the Shed commenced before 2014 and it wasn't until 2017 that we had our DA approved. This was to allow for Block B and a western extension which was focused on housing our administration, archives, library and research facilities amongst other things.

Block B was completed in 2017 but approved occupancy was not recognised until 2021. Many bureaucratic and administrative processes involving new state government legislation and regulations, local council restructuring and processes, consultants, engineers, inspectors, contractors, suppliers and Covid 19 delayed us from finally on 5th April 2022 obtaining a construction certificate to complete the western extension.

Extension work completed thus far includes:

- Updating and renegotiating contracts
- · Erection of safety fencing and signage,
- Site excavation to allow for slab and retaining walls,
- Removal of top soil of adjacent area to allow for berms, swale and complementary landscaping,
- Excavation of trenches for agricultural drainage and services,
- Installation of retaining walls including agricultural drainage and back filling,
- Setting top soil aside from the swampy bush track behind the Shed. This will be remediated once track is built up and settled with spoils already transferred from building site.
- Installing pipework to redirect kitchen sullage around edges of site,

- Exposing main sullage line, installing flex joints and wrapping pipe where it is to pass under edge thickened sections of slab,
- Redirecting copper water supply line around the edges of slab site. and
- Formation of berm to redirect run off from Douglas Pickering pavilion around shed site.

The latest heavy rain has led to the floating up of the installed sullage pipe. This will need to be reset and weighed down. Some further finishing plumbing works are still required but are now held up by the weather.

The Stramit building kit which includes materials for the structure is to be delivered on 26 th July and will need to be stored in the MPC as the building site is very boggy and would not sustain delivery.

Once final plumbing works are completed, Sydney Sheds concreter can arrange for slab installation.

We should be thankful to Stuart from 'Stuart Landscape Constructions' for the work he has done under very trying circumstances and for his constructive and very obliging input in solving problems.

We are also fortunate to have Shaun from 'Savvy Solutions Plumbing' able to attend at short notice when needed for our plumbing requirements.

When will it all be completed? I have long since given up estimating and keep reminding myself that it is not just the destination that counts but also the journey on the way. Maybe we now need to be praying to Huey.
